Jersey City Files Comprehensive Petition for Rehearing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Continued Fight to Stop the Proposed Spectra Pipeline

JERSEY CITY — **Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy** announced today that the City of Jersey City has filed a lengthy and comprehensive petition requesting a rehearing with **the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC)** who last month conditionally approved the proposal by Spectra Energy to construct a high-pressure natural gas pipeline in Jersey City.

The City's **43-page petition**, among other things, calls into the question the constitutionality of FERC to fairly evaluate construction proposals for gas pipelines since the agency is funded entirely on fees generated by energy companies.

“We have argued throughout this process that it has been one lacking any independent or thorough analysis by FERC,” said **Mayor Healy**. “The findings and arguments made by the pipeline company have been taken as gospel by FERC, while most, if not all, of our concerns have either been downplayed or disregarded.”

The City's argument is that since energy companies entirely fund FERC, FERC is biased toward those companies in a way that violates fundamental rights to due process.

The petition cites research that found since 2010, FERC has approved nearly three (3) dozen pipelines. In every case but one, the agency approved the pipeline route that the pipeline company proposed – despite the existence of dozens of viable – even preferable – alternatives.

“If we are not granted a rehearing with FERC, then we will take this issue to the federal circuit court to seek relief,” said **Mayor Healy**, who noted that the City is utilizing what may be new legal arguments for matters such as this.

The City in its petition also takes issue with FERC's decision to approve the Texas Eastern, LP pipeline, while the agency still hasn't answered key questions on major issues such as safety, the impact of the pipeline on Jersey City's booming development, and the threat of terrorism.

"Until FERC answers these questions, the agency's approval of the pipeline should not stand," said **Mayor Healy**.

For more than two years, Mayor Healy and the City of Jersey City have argued that this pipeline, which would be 30-inches in diameter with a possible pressure of 1,200 pounds per square inch, is the first of its magnitude in such a densely populated area as Jersey City. City officials, from engineers, to homeland security, to economic development experts, have challenged Spectra's claims and argued that such a pipeline would be devastating for a city like Jersey City. In fact, proposals have been made to avoid Jersey City altogether by constructing a route beneath the Hudson River.

"The proposed route for this pipeline takes it by several schools, parks, ball fields, hospitals, critical transportation infrastructure, and dense housing within our city," said **Mayor Healy**. "Based on what we have seen from pipeline accidents across the country recently and in the past, including one yesterday in Nyack, New York, we know that incidents do happen and one in Jersey City would be catastrophic."
