### MAYOR HEALY & CITY OFFICIALS SWEAR IN 29 NEW FIREFIGHTERS

Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy, members of the Municipal Council, and Fire Department officials swore in 29 new firefighters in August. The firefighters, (pictured above), completed a rigorous, 10-week training program at the Morris County Fire Academy. The new graduates will replace firefighters who have recently retired. Funding for the new firefighters is part of an \$8.2 million federal SAFER grant the City received from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security/FEMA.

“We’re happy to once again use this federal grant to continue to keep our firefighters as full a compliment as we possibly can,” said Mayor Healy. “It’s urgent we continue to fill the slots created by the recent large retirements we’ve seen over the past couple of years. These new recruits are much needed and will be much appreciated.”

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### JERSEY CITY TO HIRE 23 NEW POLICE OFFICERS

Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy announced recently that the Jersey City Police Department was successful in receiving nearly \$1.9 million in grant funding from the U.S. Department of Justice/COPS program. The funding will be used to pay the salaries for 15 of the 23 new officers, who are currently enrolled in Police Academy Training in Union County. These officers are expected to be sworn in before the end of the year.

This year, having experienced many police retirements, the administration worked with community groups and leaders to garner support for its grant application to the Department of Justice. Much of the credit for this grant goes to those residents who sent letters to our Congressional delegation on why the City needs these funds and how more officers on the street will help the Police Department continue its efforts to reduce crime.

“As we continue to move our city forward, our primary objective will remain the safety of our residents while also promoting Jersey City as an exciting place to live, work, and do business,” said Mayor Healy.

### MOODY'S RAISES JERSEY CITY'S MUNICIPAL BOND RATING

Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy announced in July that the financial investors service firm Moody's has upgraded Jersey City's municipal bond rating, citing “the city's improved financial position with structurally balanced operations, dramatically increased wealth levels and strong prospects for continued tax base growth” amongst the reasons for the upgrade.

“We are pleased that during this time of worldwide economic malaise, that our measures of fiscal restraint, downsizing, and prospective budgetary planning has paid off,” said Mayor Healy. “As we look to the future, we will continue to seek positive changes within the city's financial structure such as the continued streamlining services where possible, and we will continue to work hard to maintain this positive rating and keep Jersey City moving on the right track.”

According to the opinion released by Moody's, the service has assigned an A2 underlying rating with a positive outlook and an A2 enhanced rating with a stable outlook to Jersey City's (NJ) \$26.8 million Qualified General Improvement Bonds, Series 2012 and \$9.3 million General Obligation Refunding Bonds. Concurrently, Moody's affirms Jersey City's A2 underlying general obligation bond rating and revises to outlook to positive from negative on \$846.8 million of city and city-guaranteed long-term general obligation bonds.

## CITY BREAKS GROUND ON DPW/JCIA COMPLEX



Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy, members of the Municipal Council, as well as Department of Public Works and Jersey City Incinerator Authority officials, broke ground in July on a new state-of-the-art LEED Platinum public works facility at 13-15 Linden Avenue East.

The new DPW/JCIA complex will minimize the City's impact on the environment, create 250 direct construction jobs, and reduce operating expenses through energy savings for years to come.

The new facilities will be the staging area for all trash removal and recycling, maintenance of the City's automobile fleet, and will house the operations of street repair, snow removal, park maintenance, environmental management, and traffic control. Additionally, the JCPD's Emergency Services Unit will be located there.

"Not only are we creating construction jobs today by breaking ground on this important and sustainable public works facility, but we are also paving the way for new development of Bayfront on the city's Westside," said Mayor Healy. "With the construction of Bayfront, we will create hundreds of additional construction jobs and add to a community that will not only enhance the city, but generate millions of new tax dollars, as well."

Project funding comes from a variety of sources, including \$13 million from the Honeywell relocation fund and federal stimulus bonds.

This facility is expected to exceed LEED requirements for energy conservation, through optimization of mechanical equipment, use of hi-efficiency heat pump technology not only for radiant floor heating, but for office air conditioning as well, eliminating the emission of carbon-fluorocarbon gases. Photovoltaic solar panels will reduce the building's overall energy consumption by 77 percent. According to architects, energy usage savings for the project will translate into a nearly 60 percent savings on energy costs. Total annual operating savings over standard construction practices is expected to be more than \$200,000.

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## CITY BREAKS GROUND ON BERRY LANE PARK

Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy, the Jersey City Redevelopment Agency (JCRA), Hudson County Executive Tom DeGise, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Regional Administrator Judith Enck and other City and local officials broke ground recently on the Berry Lane Park project located at 1000 Garfield Avenue in the Morris Canal neighborhood.

Berry Lane Park will rejuvenate the Morris Canal neighborhood with a nine percent increase of usable space in Jersey City by transforming more than 17 acres of property – including former rail yards, junk yards, auto repair shops, industrial facilities, and warehouses – into the largest municipally-owned park in the city’s history.

A settlement agreement that PPG Industries entered into with the City of Jersey City and the New Jersey DEP to clean up 20 chromium sites has paved the way for the creation of Berry Lane Park. Mayor Healy has made chromium cleanup and the transformation of brownfields into productive parcels of land a focus of his administration, as evidenced at the Honeywell site, the former PJP site which is also being transformed into a park, and now Berry Lane.

“This is a vital project for our city, particularly for the residents of the Morris Canal neighborhood,” said Mayor Healy. “With sixty percent of the residents in the immediate area being children under the age of 18, Berry Lane Park will provide the space necessary for recreation and community involvement. The transformation of these fallow and deserted properties will also rid the area of a contaminated eyesore, making this neighborhood a more enjoyable place to live.”

The park’s design has been the result of residents and local officials working through a series of charrettes with the project’s contracted architects and planners. When completed, Berry Lane Park will include two basketball courts, two tennis courts, a baseball field, a soccer field, a playground, 600 new trees, and a rain garden. The park will incorporate existing sites into the design, for example, concrete silos and remnants of the former rail yard will be repurposed to serve as a spray and sprinkler park!

The following sources of funding have been committed thus far to the project: PPG reimbursement for remediation (\$5.5 million), Hudson County Open Space (\$4.4 million), City of Jersey City (\$3 million), NJ DEP Green Acres (\$2 million), EPA Cleanup Grants (\$1.4 million), CDBG grants (\$1.5 million), PPG Environmental Trust (\$600,000), EPA Assessment Grants (\$600,000), NJDEP HDSRF Grants (\$414,287), Neighborhood Stabilization Program (\$315,286), Hudson County EDC EPA loan (\$273,000), Hudson County EDC EPA subgrant (\$205,000) and Developer Contribution (Metro Homes) (\$200,000).

## SENIOR AFFAIRS CONTINUES SUCCESSFUL SENIOR ID PROGRAM

The Jersey City Division of Senior Affairs has been working hard to provide much needed services to Jersey City’s older population. This year they have been even busier than usual with the free senior citizen photo ID program.

Originally launched by Mayor Healy and the Jersey City Police Department’s Community Relations Unit, Senior Affairs now oversees the senior citizen ID program. Each heavy duty ID card has a current photo of the senior who carries it, as well as their name, address, phone number, date of birth, emergency contact information, and medical conditions, including those medications the senior may be allergic to. All of this is vital information to emergency personnel.

“The safety of our residents is our top priority,” said Mayor Healy. “This program is one additional measure we can take to protect our seniors. Should an emergency arise, emergency medical personnel will have immediate access to a senior’s medical conditions, which would be essential in getting them the immediate and proper treatment they need.”

Under Senior Affairs, the program has already been to twenty different senior sites, issuing 800 ID cards. In addition, seniors can stop by and get their free senior ID at the Senior Affairs office from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm at the Office of Senior Affairs, 1 Journal Square Plaza, 2nd Floor, at the corner of Kennedy Boulevard and Cottage Street. An additional 276 photo IDs have been issued directly from the Senior Affairs office alone, bringing the total distribution to 1,076 ID cards citywide! All Senior Photo IDs are free and available to residents age 60 or older.

## NEW RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT APPROVED FOR THE POWERHOUSE ARTS DISTRICT

Construction will soon commence on a 45-story tower that will be home to 420 residential units, as well as two art galleries and a large new restaurant that will help inject much-needed life into Jersey City’s Powerhouse Arts District. The plan, amended by the City Council in August, also calls for ten units of affordable housing to be made available on site with an additional \$1.25 million going to the City’s affordable housing trust fund. Those monies are in addition to the \$2.5 million dollars already paid by the developer for affordable housing.

This new plan represents a change to a settlement that was entered into between the City and the developer in 2007. As a result of the national downturn in the economy, building was delayed and the City agreed to these new changes in order to facilitate this important development.

Not only does this new development represent additional revenue and the advancement of an exciting new district where people will be able to come and enjoy both art and entertainment, it also means jobs. This project is expected to create some 250 construction jobs, with 20 percent of those positions going to Jersey City resident apprentices. Additionally, the developer is poised to pay over an additional \$1.5 million dollars in annual revenue to the City under the agreement.

## MAYOR HEALY CONTINUES BATTLE AGAINST SPECTRA

It’s a David and Goliath fight and Jersey City has slung a big stone. In the battle to stop plans for a monstrous, billion-dollar natural gas pipeline, the City, under the leadership of Mayor Jerramiah T. Healy, has argued the federal agency that approved the pipeline is too biased toward energy companies to be fair. In a legal motion filed in July, the City of Jersey City asserted that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) violates the United States Constitution – and its mandates regarding proper due process – when the agency considers where to site pipelines.

In May, FERC green-lighted the controversial Spectra Energy Corporation pipeline, which will traverse nearly 7 miles of Jersey City. Though the agency is required to consider alternative routes, FERC approved the pipeline route Spectra Energy proposed and desired. The decision was hardly a surprise. In the past three years, FERC has approved more than 30 natural gas pipelines: In every case but one – despite the fact FERC “considered” many alternatives – the agency approved the pipeline routes energy companies wanted. In the lone outlier case, FERC did make the pipeline company build on a different route – but only after the agency asked the pipeline company for permission to make changes to the company’s plans.

The problem at the root of FERC’s faulty decisions: The pipeline industry literally funds FERC, paying for the agency’s entire budget. The City argues this has forced FERC to become a business partner to energy companies looking to build pipelines, rather than the regulatory body it is supposed to be.

As a result, the City believes FERC gave unconstitutionally short shrift to its fears that the pipeline will put Jersey City residents at risk, harm the local environment and severely damage the City’s prospects for continued development.

The City must now wait for FERC to consider and answer its arguments. Given the complexity of the City’s case, attorneys believe FERC might not respond until the end of the year. Ultimately, the City is prepared to take the agency to Federal Court, and it remains staunchly committed to exhausting all possible avenues to stop the pipeline.
